Here are some of the highlights I shared with this class:

• Personal transformation is the essential foundation for life transforming ministry. Suffering both shapes and molds our character and, in the process, creates resilience.

- The years we live in hidden obedience, when life seems to be going nowhere, is preparation for the time God has for us in His spotlight.
- Suffering can hone our passions so God can creatively use them for His Kingdom work.

After my talk, the hosting professor said, "The class really appreciated your willingness to be so open, and they learned that you don't have to have the whole plan in place before you begin ministry,"

# **Congo Bike Delivery**

In July, 2007, we sent money for Mboligihe Ndalu's ministry in Dungu, Congo. While in Kampala, Uganada Mboligihe bought 14 bicycles and 2 bicycle tool kits. "We ordered and had a tricycle built for a disabled servant of God in Congo," wrote Mboligihe. Since this is the rainy season in Congo, they must wait for the mud and potholes to dry up before the truck can deliver the bicycles. They hoped the bicycles would arrive in Dungu by the end of November.

# **Pakistan Project**

"I thought you should see what you inspired!!"



Early in 2007 we received an email from Katie, a missionary in Pakistan. They were in need of providing some form of transportation for children with disabilities. They needed something that could handle the rough terrain, allowing children to be taken to school.

Since they weren't looking for a bike or trike I was hesitant to proceed. However, Kevin, our engineer, said it would only take a few hours to draw up plans.

Katie wrote, "Due to the great help of your drawings, we finally got a chair made. I say finally because I had some setbacks which were pretty hard to get over. But all that said, we made a chair!!! We plan to continue the building process. Thank you so much for your help." HWI's part was small, but God is great.

### Scirocco-African Wind

Our trike prototyping is taking another turn and allowing us to dream about the possibility of one day forming a handcycle racing team.

Anika, a nine-year-old adopted paraplegic from Belarus, melted Kevin's heart.



Anika rode our prototypes for 8 hours at the Joni and Friends retreat last June. "She has Olympic potential," stated a physical therapist. Anika gave birth to the dream of making a pre-racer hand cycle. This hand cycle is aerody-

namic, high-tech, multiple geared and will allow Anika to work towards her ultimate athletic potential. Our multidisciplinary team worked on proper fittings and ergonomically correct alignment. Afterward, with Anika in mind, Kevin named it Scirocco. He said, "I have found what I was created to do." Anika rode around, singing, "I'm having so much fun."

# **Trike Travels to Trujillo**

November 2<sup>nd</sup> our 4<sup>th</sup> trike prototype left the US. Nancy Biedry took the trike to Peru. She was part of a Joni and



Friends, Wheels for the World, wheelchair distribution team.

We look forward to seeing what God has planned for the Peruvians and the HWI trike prototype. We donated the trike to a Peruvian Organization that works with the disabled. While in Peru, mechanics, carpenters, physical therapists, welders, the disabled and government officials gave input about the trike.
